



Key Takeaways: What Students, Teachers and Parents Are Asking for This Year

How districts can align teaching, learning, and community support to meet online safety needs.

Schools are being asked to manage student safety with limited early visibility and overstretched support teams. Clear thresholds, better prioritization, and stronger alignment with families enable earlier, lower-acuity intervention. Consistent processes matter more than reactive responses.

- 1 Early signals increasingly appear outside the classroom.** Student risk often surfaces digitally and off-campus, even though schools are still expected to respond.
- 2 Schools need clearer prioritization, not more alerts.** Differentiating concern from crisis protects staff capacity and improves response quality.
- 3 Students want support and skill-building, not just intervention.** Students are asking for guidance, trust, and help navigating digital spaces.
- 4 Parents want clarity and partnership, not guesswork.** Parents want to support their kids but are often unsure when a concern warrants school involvement or how the school will respond.
- 5 Consistency reduces risk, burnout and liability.** Defined workflows and shared understanding matter more than perfect information.

What This Means for Your Program

- Move from reactive crisis response toward earlier intervention
- Reduce surprise escalations by improving upstream visibility
- Support counselors and administrators with clearer prioritization and triage
- Strengthen trust with families through transparency and consistency

Suggested Next Steps

- Assess where early visibility breaks down
- Clarify thresholds and response workflows
- Integrate student skill development with prevention efforts
- Strengthen family engagement with clear guidance
